Pride Sunday

On June 28, 1969, a group of queer women of color, drag queens, lesbians, and gay men resisted a police raid on the Stonewall Inn, a popular gay bar on Christopher Street in the West Village. The ensuing riots lasted for five nights. This act of resistance, led by queer women of color like Marsha P. Johnson and Sylvia Rivera, is now known as the Stonewall Uprising and is widely recognized as the birth of the Gay Liberation movement in the United States. Since then, LGBTQ+ communities around the world have recognized June as Pride Month— a time to celebrate our God-given identities and recommit to the work of liberation for our community.

Here at Trinity Church Wall Street, it has been our tradition for several years to raise Pride Flags outside Trinity Church and St. Paul's Chapel in June. This year, while our churches remain closed, our pride flags have flown throughout the month as a visible reminder that Trinity Church Wall Street holds social justice and inclusiveness among our core values. The flags serve as a reminder that we are committed to the work of celebrating, inviting, and blessing the lives and gifts of our lesbian, gay, bisexual, trans, and queer siblings.

The 6-striped rainbow flag has long been synonymous with Pride. Designed in 1978 and updated in 1979 by activist Gilbert Baker, the pride flag is recognized as a symbol of inclusion for LGBTQ+ people. During today's Pride Sunday service, our Prayers of the People draw on the reminder that God created humankind in all our wild diversity in the very image and likeness of God—and declared us good. Exactly as we are. Many of the petitions ascribe attributes to God that are drawn from the meanings Baker assigned to each of the flag stripes: red for life, orange for healing, yellow for sunlight, green for nature, indigo for serenity, and purple for spirit.



Reader

A Reading from the Book of Genesis.

God tested Abraham. He said to him, "Abraham!" And he said, "Here I am." He said, "Take your son, your only son Isaac, whom you love, and go to the land of Moriah, and offer him there as a burnt offering on one of the mountains that I shall show you." So Abraham rose early in the morning, saddled his donkey, and took two of his young men with him, and his son Isaac; he cut the wood for the burnt offering, and set out and went to the place in the distance that God had shown him.

On the third day Abraham looked up and saw the place far away. Then Abraham said to his young men, "Stay here with the donkey; the boy and I will go over there; we will worship, and then we will come back to you." Abraham took the wood of the burnt offering and laid it on his son Isaac, and he himself carried the fire and the knife. So the two of them walked on together. Isaac said to his father Abraham, "Father!" And he said, "Here I am, my son." He said, "The fire and the wood are here, but where is the lamb for a burnt offering?" Abraham said, "God himself will provide the lamb for a burnt offering, my son." So the two of them walked on together.

When they came to the place that God had shown him, Abraham built an altar there and laid the wood in order. He bound his son Isaac, and laid him on the altar, on top of the wood. Then Abraham reached out his hand and took the knife to kill his son. But the angel of the LORD called to him from heaven, and said, "Abraham, Abraham!" And he said, "Here I am." He said, "Do not lay your hand on the boy or do anything to him; for now I know that you fear God, since you have not withheld your son, your only son, from me." And Abraham looked up and saw a ram, caught in a thicket by its horns. Abraham went and took the ram and offered it up as a burnt offering instead of his son. So Abraham called that place "The LORD will provide"; as it is said to this day, "On the mount of the LORD it shall be provided."

Reader A Reading from the Letter of Paul to the Romans.

Do not let sin exercise dominion in your mortal bodies, to make you obey their passions. No longer present your members to sin as instruments of wickedness, but present yourselves to God as those who have been brought from death to life, and present your members to God as instruments of righteousness. For sin will have no dominion over you, since you are not under law but under grace.

What then? Should we sin because we are not under law but under grace? By no means! Do you not know that if you present yourselves to anyone as obedient slaves, you are slaves of the one whom you obey, either of sin, which leads to death, or of obedience, which leads to righteousness? But thanks be to God that you, having once been slaves of sin, have become obedient from the heart to the form of teaching to which you were entrusted, and that you, having been set free from sin, have become slaves of righteousness. I am speaking in human terms because of your natural limitations. For just as you once presented your members as slaves to impurity and to greater and greater iniquity, so now present your members as slaves to righteousness for sanctification.

When you were slaves of sin, you were free in regard to righteousness. So what advantage did you then get from the things of which you now are ashamed? The end of those things is death. But now that you have been freed from sin and enslaved to God, the advantage you get is sanctification. The end is eternal life. For the wages of sin is death, but the free gift of God is eternal life in Christ Jesus our Lord.
